Malaysia can be eco-design hub, says Nippon Paint

won the award after securing a total of 12,946 votes. In the Architecture category, the Student Choice Award was won by Khor Yih Chau from Universiti Sains Malaysia who secured 24,351 votes.

Speaking during the awards ceremony, Gladys Goh, Nippon Paint (Malaysia) Sdn Bhd's general manager said: "Looking at the submissions, I felt a great sense of pride that Malaysia has so much talent, especially in this field of eco-design. I look forward to the day when the country is recognised as a hub for eco-design."
