And the best part is that they will be able to stick together as Yee Chun, who also acted as his sign language interpreter, is currently completing his degree in Electrical and Electronic Engineering at the same institution.

"My brother may face difficulties communicating with his lecturers and I will be able to help him clarify things with his lecturers from time to time," he said.

Equally elated was Sarawakian, Rowena Michelle Tweedie 21 who received a three-year scholarship to pursue a degree in International

Hospitality Management at Sunway University College. As this is her first time in the peninsular Rowena is still adapting to life in Kuala Lumpur and is looking forward to studying at Sunway's

School of Hospitality, Tourism and Leisure Management. "Tourism is developing rapidly in Sarawak and I see how it is creating more job opportunities for the locals.

Agrotourism is flourishing too and I hope that my studies will equip me with the skills to further develop the industry.
