Tan sang her own composition titled Reality.



Organised by UCSI University's Student Council, more than 35 students auditioned in the first round of the competition more than a month ago.

Fourteen finalists comprised students with a wide range of talents - from magicians and dancers to actors and singers — made it to the semi-finals picked by judges who were UCSI University's Contemporary Music
Department acting head Juan Pablo De Zubiria Rueda, former television host Kevin Chong and former UCSI Student Council President Stephanie Liew.
