A man who lost his sense of smell and a mother-to-daughter cautionary story are in BMW Shorties 2012, writes **Dennis Chua**

T'S the sixth outing of annual short film who was bedridden and unconscious for a .10 films are in the running for the coveted

The films are Sincerely, The End by Lee Wei Sheong, Talent House by Tan Hyon-Le, Crossroads by Rebecca Yau, Da Capo by Tan Ce Ding, Das by Suresh Naidu, Haruman Hujan by Martin Chong, Johan Adam by Lim Pik Lan, Leap Of Faith by Bryan Lim, Murdered by Chua Dick Woei and Muthal Naal Indru (The First Day) by Jagatesh Letchumanan.

Haruman Hujan, which is also up for Best Sound Design, is a humorous yet poignant he created the 16-minute film with his brother story of a man who lost his sense of smell in a car accident.

Chong, its director, says: "The seven-minute film is a true story. Khairul Ridzuan, its main actor, had a car accident in 2008, and has since struggled to regain his sense of smell.'

"Ng and Chew are our students in Taylor's University," says Chong.

"The four of us watched past winners in order to come up with a good story," adds Razif, who used to work in a computer games

They are fans of Guang, last year's winning film directed by Quek Shio Chuan. "Its simple storytelling inspired us," says Ng.

"We recreated a hospital scene for Khairul,

Haruman Hujan is their first entry in the Best Film award which carries a RM75,000 competition. Previously, they participated in the KL 48 Hour Film Festival 2011, winning Best Character Design for short film Escape.

Director Jagatesh says his film, The First Day, is a major awards contender in the fes-

'We have been nominated for Best Film, Screenplay, Sound Design, Editing, Actress (Jaya Ganason) and Cinematography," he savs.
